Ravenna is a progressive community that values young people. The entire community strives to meet the educational, social and emotional needs of its students. There are many examples of the community's dedication to this task. Several years ago, the school district completed a \$14 million building expansion and renovation project. The work included science and technology labs, additional classroom space and physical education and athletic facilities. The facility modification also made possible a grade re-configuration to K-5, 6-8 and 9-12 buildings.

The entire core curriculum has been revised to mirror the requirements of state and federal mandates and guidelines. Pre-school and day care programs have been enhanced and expanded and Head Start is now housed in the elementary building.

With facilities and accompanying programs securely in place, a greater focus has been placed on the continual improvement of student outcomes. All district schools met federal adequate yearly progress standards in 2008/2009. The trend for MEAP scores is up with scores in most categories exceeding state averages. Under the Education Yes! Michigan Accreditation system our elementary and middle schools received an "A" and the high school received a "B".

The school district has also created a partnership with community groups and units of government to provide social programs and safety-focused programs to better care for the changing needs of youngsters and their families.

The community is small in size, but the citizens, in concert with the schools, have made a commitment to meet the needs of all students. While much has been accomplished, successes continue to be "a work in progress."

Ravenna Public Schools has been in existence since 1849. Our district boundaries incorporate the southeast section of Muskegon County, some of the northeast corner of Ottawa County. It encompasses about 100 square miles. About 1100 students fill out buildings where a dedicated staff helps each one grow both academically and emotionally. Our size helps us to know each and every student and their families. We offer a challenging curriculum, opportunities for dual enrollment within the county and opportunities for students to start career training at our county Career Tech Center.

Specialized Schools

TECH CENTER

Ravenna students are offered the opportunity to attend the Muskegon Career Tech Center. This center provides access to high quality career and technical education. The focus of each program is to provide students with entry-level job skills leading to employment or post-secondary training. Curriculum is aligned to the new high school content standards. Programs in each center are open to Junior and Senior level students.

CHOICES

Choices provides an alternative means for senior high school students to work toward earning their diploma. The goals of the program are: to enable students to successfully complete high school graduation requirements, to increase each student's self esteem, to produce students ready to go out into the work force by helping them mature and grow into responsible, self-sufficient adults, to provide students with strategies for problem solving, coping with pressure and abiding by rules and regulations. They also learn that attendance, timeliness, cooperation, attitude, and responsibility are expected of adults in the real world.

MUSKEGON PUBLIC SCHOOLS - CENTRALIZED EDUCATION PROGRAMS

Centralized special education programs are available for eligible students who are ages 6 to 26. Centralized classroom programs are available for cognitive impaired and other special education designations. Additional support services available to all Muskegon County schools include: Hearing and Vision Consultants, Audiology, Orientation and Mobility, Physically and Otherwise Health Impaired and Autistic Consultants and Occupational and Physical Therapy. Centralized programs are located at Beach Elementary in Fruitport and Muskegon Tech Center as well as other sites throughout Muskegon County.

Ravenna is a member of the four district Eastern Service Unit that coordinates special education services for each district.

STUDENT ASSESSMENT

Student progress remains as the focus for our district. No Child Left Behind, a federal law, requires that students in grades 3 through 8 receive tests in the areas of reading and math. The law also states that progress toward 100% achievement be met in English language arts and math. To help each school measure their continuing progress, our state has provided us with MEAP tests given in October of each year. Science and Social Studies are also tested in fifth and eighth and sixth and ninth respectively. The High School now takes the Michigan Merit Exam (MME) given in March. This test includes the ACT test, portions of the Work Keys test and supplemental testing in math, science and social studies. Students that were Juniors in the 2005-06 school year were the first students to take this test. Scores in our next annual report will reflect their scores. Both the MEAP and the MME tests give us an annual look at where we are and where we need to get better.

Students receive scores of 1 - Exceeding State Standards, 2 - Met state standards, 3 – Basic and 4 – Apprentice. The state considers anyone who scores a 1 or 2 on the tests to be proficient. School scores are compared based on the number of proficient students each school has. Each school must met the minimum number of proficient scores to meet Adequate Yearly Progress in both reading and math. The Table below shows the target scores as well as the number of proficient students we had in each category.

Core Curriculum & Instructional Improvement

CURRICULUM AND INSTRUCTION

All teachers are teaching the state mandated grade level content expectations. Our district implements the KC4 Curriculum. Teachers adapt the lessons and assessments to address the needs of our students and their learning styles. Data from the MEAP tests and other assessments drive our improvement goals and our instructional strategies. Professional development for staff is also guided by this data. As new state standards and guidelines change our curriculum also changes to meet them.

Curriculum maps, brochures or syllabuses are provided in each school to help parents and students understand what will be taught throughout the year. Communication between staff, parents and students help to make students successful throughout the year.

TECHNOLOGY LITERACY SCORES

Our students receive instruction in computer skills based on the State Technology Standards.

In eighth grade they take an assessment that is based on these same standards. Students are expected to pass the test with a score of at least 60%. This assessment is given at the end of the 12 week computer exploratory class. This year 97% of our students scored 60% or better on this exam.

As we look at the scores the staff analyses the areas that seem to be low and curricular changes are made.

STUDENT TESTING

We use the Successful Test Taking series from Leadership Resources to monitor our students progress throughout the year. Because the MEAP test is given in the fall, we have scheduled these test once each year.

These assessments are aligned to the new Grade Level Content Standards and include two writing assessments. They are used in grades 3 - 8. Students in grade 2 continue to take the Strategic Student Inventory (SSI) in reading and math. All students from Kindergarten through grade 2 also complete two school-wide writes during the year. These are scored by teachers using a common rubric.

K-5 grade students are given the DIBELS Reading test, the Star Reader test and the Star Math test three times per year. Students needing assistance are given additional reading help. First - fifth grade students participate in the accelerated reader program.

All the assessments we use help our instructional program by providing teachers with relevant data to drive their instruction. It also allows students the opportunity to encounter MEAP-like tests more often.

The entire staff at the middle school meets monthly to discuss issues pertaining to the school improvement process. Academic goals and strategies were revisited and refined in order to improve instruction. A great deal of time was spent modifying the improvement plan in order to be in compliance with Education Yes! and No Child Left Behind legislation.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

Professional Development continues to be a component of the improvement plan that is ever changing. All professional development occurring at the middle school is linked to our academic goals. Timelines have been developed in order to specifically meet the development needs of all staff in our goal areas.

The Strategic Student Inventory was administered to all 6th and 7th grade students in the spring. The 8th grade participated in a new assessment this year called the Explore test. The Explore test is designed to help students understand what high school courses they may be interested in, to steer students into a direction for a career, and to prepare students for the ACT test which is taken as part of the Michigan Merit Exam during a student's junior year. All of our students also are assessed in their reading ability through the STAR reader test series. These assessments help to determine individual needs and progress in math, science, ELA, and reading.

ACCREDITATION

During the 2008-09 school year, Ravenna Middle School once again achieved Adequate Yearly Progress based on MEAP scores and legislation designed by Education Yes! and No Child Left Behind. For the fourth year in a row, The Education Yes! grade for Ravenna Middle School has been an "A." At RMS, we are very proud of the hard work and accomplishments of our staff and students!

Both the Building Improvement Team and teaching staff met throughout the year to discuss standardized and authentic assessments and how to best integrate them with the curriculum and school improvement goals. The focus has continued to be in the areas of math, ELA, science, social studies and reading.

ACCREDITATION

Like the other schools in the district, the high shcool receives a grade from the state each year. For the year 2008-2009 our school recedived a B. To obtain this grade score the state uses various information. The number of students who score at the proficient or above the proficient levels is one consideration. The High School has consistently made Adequate Yearly Progress on state tests.

Graduation rates and the results from a selfassessment based on the standards given to us in the School Improvement Frameworks are two other factors that are also considered. This means that parent involvement, curricular improvements, leadership, school improvement and staff professional growth and development are evaluated each year. Our goal is to continue to provide an educational atmosphere that allows our students to grow into productive adult citizens.

School Improvement Plan

The High School Building Improvement Committee meets once a month during the school year to address School Improvement issues. One of the teacher's meetings is set for school improvement planning, decisions, strategies, and evaluating.

We have adopted all of the Michigan Merit curriculum in the four core areas: Math, Language Arts, Science and Social Studies. We are currently waiting for the updated Social Studies curriculum.

We continually discuss our course offerings and realign those offerings to benefit our students. We continue to review our MME test results and observe where our students fall short of understanding course concepts that are covered on the MME.

We also address our school environment and positive student behavior. Many community members, substitute teachers and visitors comment on how well Ravenna High School students conduct themselves outside of Ravenna.

Decision Making

The small size of our district and the common values shared by this close knit rural community makes district and building level decision making easy.

Each school has a school improvement committee that deals with instructional and social behavioral issues. Members of each team gather to discuss issues and present their findings to the entire school population for input and adoption.

District decisions are made with input from administrators, staff and parents. Committees to address issues are formed and remain in tact for as long as they are needed. Parents are invited to share their ideas at the school and district level. They are invited to be members of ad hoc and other improvement committees.

NORTH EAST EDUCATION CENTER

Mission Statement: To provide education and habilitation through trust and understanding.

The North East Education Center is a segregated facility that serves severely emotionally impaired students in grades K-12. Students come from nine separate districts located within Muskegon County. It is composed of three classrooms: 1 elementary, 1 middle school and 1 high school. Each classroom consists of one certified special education teacher and one or two paraprofessionals. There are also two additional paraprofessionals who work with all three classrooms and the time-out area.

In addition to classroom staff, there is a full-time school social worker, secretary and special education supervisor.

Academic classes that are offered include the basic core classes (math, science, social studies, language arts, physical education and art) in addition to a focus on social skills, both in the classroom and through school social work services. Each classroom has multiple computer stations with internet access which allows students the opportunity to use resources from the world wide web. Finally, older students have the opportunity to attend the Muskegon County Career Tech Center.

North East Education Center is in the process of converting to Ravenna Public Schools curriculum offerings. The primary goal of academic achievement at NEEC is based on improving behavior so that each student spends the maximum amount of time in the classroom each day. By doing so, instructional time increases which allows for greater opportunity to assess achievement and understanding. A new credit recovery program will be in place for the fall of 2009/2010. E2020 will allow high school students the opportunity to recover credits or take advanced courses such as Chemistry. Transportation

Transportation is arranged and provided by the student's home school district. The North East Education Center receives students from nine districts throughout Muskegon County.

Food Service

Students have the option to receive breakfast and lunch.

North East Education Center is a segregated facility for severely emotionally impaired students. However, other special education eligibilities are also represented: 2 autism spectrum disorders (ASD) students also receive services.

It is important to note that NEEC is a specialized, segregated facility and therefore has a small enrollment. Staff and administration have regular contact with parents/guardians in order to ensure that student behavior, academic progress, as well as other issues, are clearly communicated in order to help students achieve his/her goals.
